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Message from our Campus Principal



Welcome to 2023. It has been a busy and generally positive start to the year. As usual the first part of our new school year is always a time for new students to get their heads around the different demands and expectations of the senior campus. At Year 11 it is also a time when students come together from the two Kurnai junior campuses and other schools from both inside and outside Latrobe City. So, there is the

School News

Mt. Rothwell Environmental Science Camp

In early February, the Year 12 Environmental Science class went on a three-day camp in the Brisbane Ranges National Park. During camp, students performed a series of tests on the water, soil and air quality of Boar Gully. Students also visited the Mt. Rothwell Conservation



Centre (the largest feral predator free ecosystem in Victoria) to learn about the conservation of various endangered and endemic Victorian species of marsupial, including the Eastern Barred Bandicoot – the focus species for the first outcome of the Environmental Science Study Design. Students made bait, set up traps and waited until after dark to check the traps for nocturnal animals during a guided spotlight tour of the facility. The animals were especially active on the night where students observed Quolls, Betongs, Potteroos, Eastern Barred Bandicoots and dozens of Southern Brush-tailed Rock Wallabies (of which there are only 230 in the world). The students successfully caught a Quoll, which they were able to handle, and several Betongs. The following day, students revisited the Conservation Centre to observe the site during the day for 'signs of life'. They learned about scats, diggings and how to track for various animals. They later hiked up to the top of Mt. Rothwell surveying and learning about various plants and animals on the way. Students also visited the Werribee Gorge National Park to observe for signs of landscape change over time and discuss the possible effects of changing environments on Biodiversity. Overall, the excursion was a fantastic and engaging opportunity for students to learn first-hand how populations of critically endangered species are caught, tagged, tested, monitored and conserved.

Appendix A

Fact sheet 1: school council elections – information for parents

What is a school council and what does it do?
All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to act as the board of directors of a school, in accordance with Ministerial Order 1020 Constitution of Government School Councils, and the Education and Training Reform Act 2008. In doing this, a school council may directly influence the quality of education for students.

Who is on the school council?
For most primary school councils, there are several possible categories of membership:

- **A mandated elected parent member category** – more than one-third of the total members must be from this category according to Ministerial Order 1020. Department employees can be parent members at their child's school provided that they are not engaged in work at the school.
- **A mandated elected school employee member category** – members of this category make up no more than one-third of membership. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.
- **An optional community member category** – members are appointed by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experience. Department employees are not eligible to be community members.
- A small number of school councils have nominated members.

For all schools with a Year 7 and above cohort, there is an additional category of membership:

- **A mandated elected student member category** – two positions.

Generally, the term of office for all members is two years. The term of office of half the members expires each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

Why is parent membership so important?
Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills and a range of experiences and knowledge that can help inform and shape the direction of the school. Those parents who become active in a school council find their involvement satisfying and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

Do I need special experience to be on school council?

Each member brings their own valuable skills and knowledge to the role. However, in order to successfully perform their duties, council members may need to gain some new skills and knowledge. It is important to meet in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

Code of conduct for school councilors

School councils in Victoria are public entities as defined by the Public Administration Act 2004. School councilors must comply with the Code of Conduct for Directors of Victorian Public Entities issued by the Victorian Public Sector Commission. The Code of Conduct is based on the Victorian public sector values and requires councilors to:

- **act with honesty and integrity** – be truthful, open and clear about their motives and declare any real, potential or perceived conflict of interest and duty
- **act in good faith in the best interests of the school** – work cooperatively with other councilors and the school community to be responsible and make all decisions with the best interests of students foremost in their minds
- **act fairly and impartially** – consider all relevant facts of an issue before making a decision; seek to have a balanced view; never give special treatment to a person or group and never act from self-interest
- **use information appropriately** – respect confidentiality and use information for the purpose for which it was made available
- **exercise due care, diligence and skill** – accept responsibility for decisions and do what is best for the school
- **use the position appropriately** – not use the position as a platform to gain an advantage
- **act in a financially responsible manner** – observe all applicable policies when making financial decisions
- **comply with relevant legislation and policies** – know what legislation and policies are relevant for their decisions and obey the law
- **demonstrate leadership and stewardship** – act to good example; encourage others of accountability; manage risks effectively; exercise care and responsibility to keep the school strong and sustainable.

Indemnity for school council members

School councilors are indemnified against any liability in respect of any loss or damage suffered by the council or any other person in respect of anything necessarily or reasonably done, or omitted to be done by the councilor in good faith in: a) the exercise of a power or the performance of a function of a councilor; or b) the responsible belief that the act or omission was in the exercise of a power or the performance of a function of a councilor.

In other words, school councilors are not legally liable for any loss or damage suffered by council or others as a result of reasonable actions taken in good faith.

How can you become involved?

By participating in, and voting in the school council elections, which are held in Term 1 each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant. In view of this, you might consider:

- standing for election as a member of the school council
- encouraging another person to stand for election.

What do you need to do to stand for election?

The principal will issue a Notice of Election and Call for Nominations in Term 1 of each year. Council elections must be completed by 31 March, unless varied by the Minister for Education.

If you stand for election, you can arrange for someone to nominate you as a candidate or you can nominate yourself in the parent member category. You can only be nominated by another member of the same category that you are eligible for (e.g. a member of the parent electorate may only nominate another parent of that electorate).

Department employees with a child enrolled at a school where they are not engaged in work, are eligible to nominate for parent membership at that school. Return your completed nomination form to the principal within the time stated on the Notice of Election. You will receive a nomination Form Receipt via post, email or by hand delivery.

Generally, if there are more nominations than vacancies a ballot will be conducted in the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.

Remember

- Consider standing for election to school council.
- Ask the principal for instructions if you are not sure what to do.
- Be sure to vote if the election goes to ballot.
- Contact the principal if you are unsure about what is required at any stage of the election process.

Consent for Microsoft to access specific personal information of your child
We seek your consent for your child to use the above stated Office 365 Education online services. To enable your child to sign-on and access these services, Microsoft require access to your child's Department of Education & Training username, first and last name, year level and school. If you do not provide consent, your child will not have access to the online services and alternate arrangements for allocating work will be made.

Parental access to Personal Information
The Department of Education and Training's ('Department') use and handling of your child's personal information is governed by the *Privacy and Data Protection Act 2014 & Health Records Act 2001(Victoria)*. You can access personal information held by the Department about you and your child under the *Freedom of Information Act 1982 (Victoria)*. If a mistake in that personal information is identified, the Department is required to correct it under the *Privacy and Data Protection Act 2014*. Microsoft's Online Services Terms provides further information on how Microsoft may use your child's personal information.

Providing a safe online environment
Use of online services will be subject to classroom supervision during school hours. A 'Report Abuse' facility will be provided for students to report unacceptable behaviour. A nominated member of staff will address the issue during school hours. To further assist your child in having safe and positive experiences online, you can refer to parent information on the Australian Government's Office of the Children's Safety Commissioner website: <https://osafcty.gov.au/>. In addition, staff at our school have been advised that the use of Office 365 Education is strictly for teaching and learning material only (e.g. lesson plans and classwork) and staff do not upload your child's personal, sensitive, health; or security classified information into Office 365 Education.

Student responsibilities when using online services
When using Office 365 Education, students continue to be responsible for their behaviour as outlined in our school's Students Acceptable Use Agreement. The main themes of this agreement are:

- Communicate respectfully;
- Protect personal information; and
- Look after yourself and others.

Safety

The Australian Federal Police through the [Australian Centre to Counter Child Exploitation](#) is seeing a concerning global trend of teenage males being targeted to send explicit images of themselves and then blackmailed. This is called sexual extortion, or sextortion.

The AFP is urging families to have important safety conversations ahead of the school holidays to prevent young people from becoming victim. This crime can have serious wellbeing and psychological impacts.

How does sextortion start?

- Unsolicited friend and follow requests on social media
- Direct messages on one app and then being asked to keep chatting on a secondary app
- Conversations suddenly and quickly becoming sexualised
- Requests for sexualised images or content.

What can families do?

- Have open and regular conversations about your child's online activities and interactions
- Know what platforms, apps and games they are using and who they are interacting with
- Remain open and approachable, victims will be reluctant to come forward if they feel they will be punished or blamed
- Ensure your child knows that it is okay to leave conversations if they feel uncomfortable or unsafe
- Support your child and know how to respond. The [Online blackmail and sexual extortion response kit](#) has been created to recognise sextortion and get help.

The Australian Centre to Counter Child Exploitation is here to keep young people safe from online sexual exploitation and abuse.



School Procedures for the Bushfire Season

Schools on the Bushfire At-Risk Register and Schools at Risk of Grassfire (Category 4)

Fire danger ratings and warnings are used in Victoria to provide clear direction on the safest options for preserving life.



Schools and children's services listed on the DET Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) and those at risk of grassfire (Category 4) will be closed when a Code Red fire danger rating day (Catastrophic) is determined in their Bureau of Meteorology district. **Our school has been identified as being one of those at high bushfire or grassfire risk.**

Where possible, we will provide parents with up to four days notice of a potential Code Red day closure by Compass or SMS. A Code Red day will be determined by the Emergency Management Commissioner no later than 1.00 pm the day before the potential closure. Once we are advised of the confirmation of the Code Red day (Catastrophic) we will provide you with advice before the end of the school day.

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, regardless of improvements in the weather forecast. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child. It is also important to note that:

- No staff will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Code Red day (Catastrophic).
- School camps will be cancelled if a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined for the Bureau of Meteorology district in which the camp is located.
- All bus routes that travel through the Code Red area will be cancelled.
- Depending on which Bureau of Meteorology district is impacted bus route cancellations may affect our school.

On these Code Red days families are encouraged to enact their Bushfire Survival Plan – **on such days children should never be left at home alone or in the care of older children.**

For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the Country Fire Authority (CFA) advises that when Code Red days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night

before or early on the morning of the Code Red day .

As part of preparing our school for potential hazards such as fire, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan, re-prioritised any maintenance works that may assist in preparing for the threat of fire and cleared our facility's grounds and gutters.

What can parents do?

- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event that our school is closed.
- Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers. Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, by checking our website kurnai.co and by talking to your child's teacher or any other member of the teaching staff about our emergency management plan.
- Most importantly at this time of year, if you're planning a holiday or short stay in the bush or in a coastal area, you should check warnings in advance of travel and remain vigilant during your stay.
- If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.


