Message from our Principal continues.....






Parent Teacher Conversations

Message from our Principal continues.....

Hi! Welcome to Stymie, it's really great to be part of the Kurnai College community!

So, what is Stymie? Stymie is an old fashioned word that means to stop, or thwart.

Stymie is a **webapp**, that delivers encrypted, anonymous and confidential notifications and where possible, uploaded evidence including screenshots to authorised recipients about issues of abuse, harm and unacceptable behaviour.

Stymie is an online, confidential messaging service for anyone who is needing help or concerned about someone else. Stymie provides a proactive opportunity for students to say something about harmful behaviours or anything they are concerned about for themselves, or someone else.

It works, because it is accessible 24/7, anonymous, easy to use and messages are typically delivered in a few seconds to approved notification recipients.

Today we launched Stymie in your school with a powerful launch day educational event. The launch day is for the entire community (year 5-12 and teachers) . The launch day describes the reason why Stymie is important, and introduces the caring, empathetic and appropriate use of the platform.

We highlight issues and behaviours in society that are concerning, and how easily we too can be bystanders.

What we do, complements the wellbeing framework that already exists in your school.

Our focus is on breaking the cycle of harm and abuse through education, intervention and prevention. We know that the first step (in breaking the cycle of harm) is to reduce the stigma associated with reaching out for help.

Our **CEO, Rachel Downie, 2020 QLD Australian of The Year** developed Stymie as a way to empathetically connect us with our courage, honesty and conscience, to enable us to speak out about issues we are concerned about for ourselves and others. In doing so Rachel's ambition is to help us all rewrite our culture to one of care in the communities we interact with everyday.







Punctuality

Davinci Machines Excursion On Wednesday 24th March,

Year 9 students were able to participate in a guided tour of the Da Vinci Machines exhibit at the Latrobe Regional Gallery. Students were able to observe and discuss Da Vinci's different flight machine designs, paintings, his military machines and water safety devices. They were also able to engage with some of his moving machines. Students showed a fascination with how modern these designs and machines appeared and how successful they were, for the most part. They were also intrigued as to how Da Vinci had been able to fulfil his military designs while still preserving and protecting human life. Students were respectful, polite and asked questions throughout the experience and represented Kurnai positively. Well done to all that participated.

Around the classrooms

In each edition of the Year 9 news, a Year 9 team member will share some of what has been happening around the classrooms lately. This week, Glen Stephenson will share some of the work happening in the Digital Technologies Project class.

Student have been developing websites this term in Digttech. Respectful Relationships: Man Cave and Flourish Girl

Our annual Year 10 Celebration Day (all day compulsory school activity) is happening on **Wednesday 31st March**. We have a whole day event for our Year 10 boys (Man Cave) and Year 10 girls (Flourish Girl).

- 'There is no handbook to becoming a man'. Man Cave is making a return visit to catch up and run a follow up session with our Year 10 boys. They first met and worked with our students two years ago when they were in Year 8!
- 'Girls are empowered to create a vision of the woman they want to become'. We have also arranged for Flourish Girls to support our female students on this day who will encourage our girls to dive deep and reflect on what it means to be their authentic self and create a vision for who they want to become.

Students must be in school uniform, bring recess snack, a water bottle. Lunch is provided (already selected and ordered by each student).

The mobile phone: do you control it or does it control you?

The ban of mobile phones in all Victorian Government Schools was announced **two years ago** by our Education Minister, James Merlino.



The reasons for this ban included the mounting evidence that demonstrated the mobile phone is a distractor in the classroom and does impact student learning. I am aware and have seen numerous Year 10 students have their mobile device with them in class and numerous students not doing the right thing and handing their device to a staff member when asked to do so.

This week I asked students to think about who is really in control – do they control their mobile phone or does their mobile phone control them? Most believe that they control their phone – why then is it necessary to have their mobile phone with them all the time?

Students have been reminded that if they are found with their mobile phone, they will be asked to surrender the phone to the staff member who will then take it to the front office. **Parents/guardians** will be notified and asked to **collect** the phone from school.



Churchill Peer Support Report

During the past 5 weeks or so we have had the pleasure of being able to get to know the Year 7's of 2021. We have been able to use our 5th period on each Friday to play games and activities based on getting to know our Year 7's as well as the Year 7's being able to get to know each other.

On Thursdays (periods 3 & 4) all the peer support leaders get together for two hours and plan our Friday lessons with our group. We discuss different games to play outside such as, 'dodge ball', 'octopus' and 'Simon Says', as well as games we can play inside such as 'silent ball', 'paper toss', and 'wink murderer'.

Friday sessions are really welcoming for our Year 7's, and ourselves, and gives the Year 7's an opportunity to make new friends, play games and invites them to get to know older students - as not just their role models but also as their friends that they can come to at any point. Over the past 5 weeks we have been able to get our new Year 7's out of their shells and make new friends.



Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund applications

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you have a valid means-tested **concession card**, such as a Veterans Affairs Gold Card, Centrelink Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible. There is also a special consideration category for asylum seeker and refugee families.

Payment amount this year is \$225 for eligible secondary school students. Payments are made direct to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions and sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

If you applied for CSEF through our school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year, unless there has been a change in your family circumstances **or you have enrolled a new student to the school.**

If you would like to apply for the first time, please contact the school office on 5165 0700 and ask for an application form.

You can also download the form, and find out more about the program and eligibility, on the Department of Education and Training's Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund web page.

Check with the school office if you are unsure, and please return completed forms to the school office as soon as possible.

Applications close **18/6/2021**.



UNIFORM

Active Kids Voucher Program

The Minister for Community Sport recently announced the opening of the Get Active Kids Voucher Program.

The Get Active Kids Voucher Program will support the delivery of 100,000 vouchers to support children to get involved in organised sport and active recreation activities. Vouchers of up to \$200 can go towards the cost of membership, club fees, uniforms, and sports equipment.

Applicants will need to meet the following eligibility criteria, to apply you must be:

- the parent or legal guardian or temporary foster or kinship carer of an eligible child
- the holder of a valid Australian Government Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card with named dependants, and
- the holder of a valid Australian Government Medicare card with named dependants


