Work Ethic

Inaugural Virtual Work Experience Program

Early on in our planning for this years' work experience program, we were aware of the restrictions placed on students seeking experience in the health sector due to the current pandemic. From this issue, the concept of a virtual work experience program was explored and made possible in collaboration with Gippsland Tech School and Latrobe Community Health Services. Thanks to the dedication of our careers adviser, Suze Benson, who led the negotiations with our partner agencies to the delivery of a four-day design thinking challenge program that saw students access and use the breadth of existing tech school infrastructure for vocational and applied learning.

Monday

Students received their design challenge from a NDIS client who lives with a disability. The students explored and defined the problem before gathering in small working groups to collaborate on a solution to the challenges that this young person faces on a daily basis.

Tuesday

Students were given an opportunity to witness a simulated code blue hospital emergency as well as experience the role of an aged care worker to assist "Frank" and "Mary" to get in and out of bed using the lift assistance machines in our state-of-the-art facilities at Fed Training.



Wednesday

Our students continued to perform and conduct themselves as progressive young adults putting their creative mindsets on display as they tackled their design challenge to come up with a prototype that is designed to assist those who live with a disability.

Thursday

The opportunities did not stop on the final day with students having the chance to hear from some of our local paramedics.

We would like to acknowledge Gippstech School Director, Paul Boys and his team who went above and beyond for our students, giving them the exposure to an industry that they had no hope in accessing in the wake of Covid. I would personally like to thank our careers officer, Suze Benson, who supported our students over the four days and drove this inaugural initiative which, I sense, will have a firm place in our work experience program in the years to come!

To all our other students who completed their work experience placements – well done! The feedback has been overwhelmingly positive with a few lucky students gaining employment because of the work ethic and attitude in the workplace! For the rest of the term – students will be considering and selecting their preferred pathway for 2022. See the Careers section for more details.

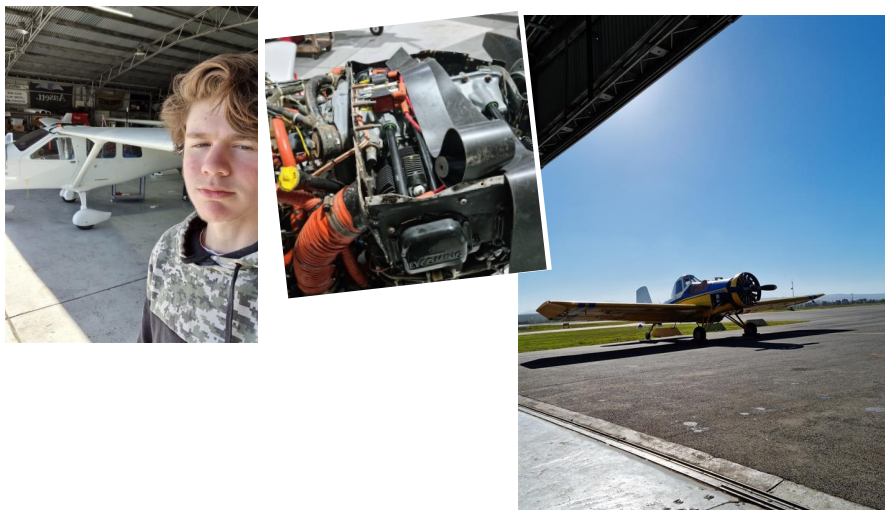

Welcome back to all of our Year 10 students who participated in the 2021 Work Experience program. Such a great week had by most and so much to gain from this opportunity.

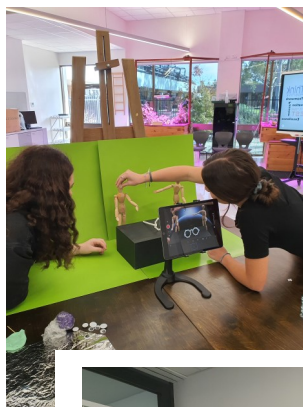
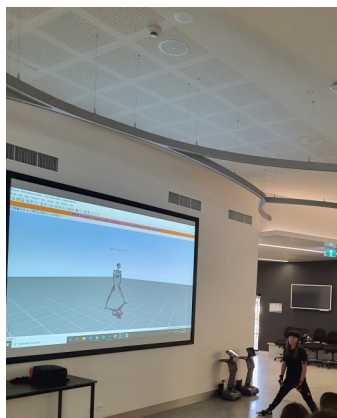

VIRTUAL WORK EXPERIENCE NEWS!!

In the wake of COVID, Year 10 students could not gain Work Experience in Hospitals or Aged Care. To strengthen student's career understandings about Health-Related Pathways, we worked with Gippsland Tech School to provide exposure to this industry through a virtual world. Over 4 days, 18 students immersed themselves in a design thinking challenge. In addition to meeting with health industry specialists, students completed masterclasses in Creative Thinking, Animation, Electronics, Laser Design and Laser Cutting/Printing. This then aided them in developing a prototype that would assist a person who faces daily setbacks resulting from living with a disability/ies.

What do parents need to do?

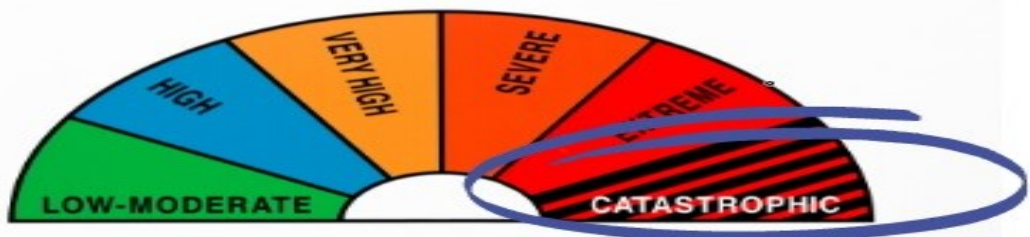
We just need you to provide consent. Please read and sign the consent forms that come home with your child and return them to the classroom teacher.

The Smile Squad team will then check your child's teeth and mouth and show them how to keep their teeth healthy and strong. They will also provide any preventive services you have consented for. If your child needs more treatment, the Smile Squad will contact you.

Who is Smile Squad?

The bright orange Smile Squad vans are staffed by experienced oral health therapists, dental therapists, dental assistants and dentists. They all have lots of experience treating children and a passion for improving their oral health – for life.
